1. Parks & Trails Tour Date, Bryan Kast

The City is planning a tour of its parks and trails again this year. The tour will include members of City Council, Planning Commission and Parks Board and is scheduled for Saturday, April 25, from 9-noon.

2. Trail Map & Signage; Naming, Bryan Kast

Bryan reiterated Board preferences regarding Trailhead and Map signage. Trailhead signs would resemble a kiosk or a roofed unit with a plexi glass door where the map would be protected and securely housed. At strategic locations along the trail, smaller maps would show your location, possibly trail color coding, numbering system and/or trail names. Bryan will bring a prototype of the map to the Board for input.

Officer Jason Ferris shared recommendations on how to help 911 dispatchers locate someone needing emergency assistance on trails. This could include color coding trails on maps with corresponding mile markers and the City's logo. Visual landmarks are easier to remember verses a new street name or neighborhood. The more specifics given, the easier it will be for officers to locate and assist someone in need.

NEW BUSINESS - [6:58 PM](#)

1. Outreach, Chair Kimberly Stenbak

Chair Stenbak provided a handout of community and volunteering events. She encouraged Board Members to attend these events and use them as outreach opportunities to gather and exchange ideas with citizens about future parks and trails.

2. Trail Connections and Priority, Bryan Kast

Bryan presented an overhead of the updated trail map system and asked the Board to identify (one or two) trail connections that staff should be focusing on over the next year or two. After discussion, the Board recommended segment #3 (downtown Pioneer Street), segment #24 (Smythe Rd) and segment #14 (Royle Road) as priorities. Bryan will present this information to Council.

3. Community Survey, Bryan Kast - [7:29 PM](#)

Bryan shared results of the community survey completed by Colbalt Community Research. The full version is available on the City's website. Overall the city is outperforming benchmarks in most areas, but scores softened slightly from 2015. In addition to trails, we need to expand our multimodal network as a whole to create other opportunities besides walking and biking. Parks are still important but the public seems to be satisfied with the amount of parks we have for our population. There were 1500 survey's sent out. We received 393 back which was 26% response rate, similar to the response in 2015.

PUBLIC COMMENT - [7:40 PM](#)

Bruce Carpenter Resident:

Bruce encouraged the City to add their trails to the All Trails app. For trailhead signs, use a photo of the trail map instead of paper. For trail maintenance, add a note on trail signs asking citizens to pick up litter. And encourage businesses to sponsor trails along their areas. Finally, create a catchy byline as part of the Parks Board outreach efforts to the community. This identifies who the message is coming from and sounds better than just Parks Board.

Grant Cowie Resident:

Grant inquired about the Clark County Legacy Land located in the City limits of Ridgefield. He asked if the City would work with the county to install trails through this area since the area was set apart for recreational purposes.

STAFF REPORTS - [7:50 PM](#)**Public Works Update**

Bryan provided an update on Park Impact Fees: By the end of January the balance was \$446,000. February was not closed out so he was unable to obtain those figures. He also mentioned there is money to retain a landscape architect to help guide the Board in the concept development plan of new Horns Corner Park. The Board shared some ideas for this park and agreed that a landscape architect would be helpful.

FROM THE BOARD - [7:55 PM](#)**Board Member Updates**

Chair Stenbak met with the Garden Club who shared their vision for beautifying Eagles View Park. Representatives include Main Street, the Arts Association, high school students, etc. Together, they plan to revitalize and maintain Eagle's View's passive-serenity ambiance. The Garden Club shared several great ideas but also asked Kim for input from the Board.

Board Member Bouvier receives a play ground catalog where an entire section is dedicated to inclusive play equipment. If interested, she is happy to let Board Members borrow it.

Council Update

The study session was moved to 5:00pm. The Parks Board portion is from 5:00pm - 5:45pm. After his session is another study session for the subarea plan for Carty Road. Steve is doing the presentation.

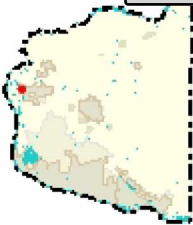

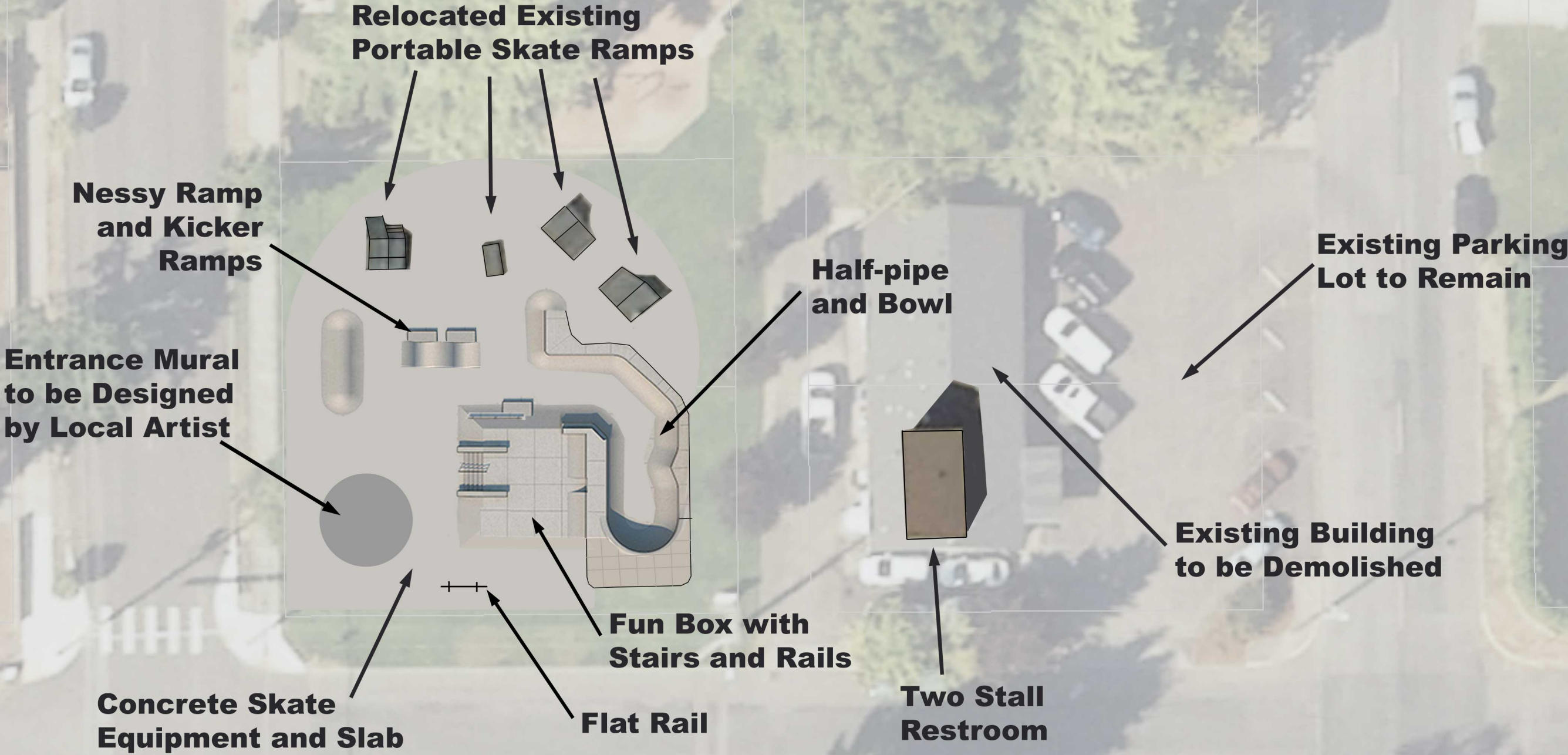


Ridgefield Skate Park Preliminary Site Plan

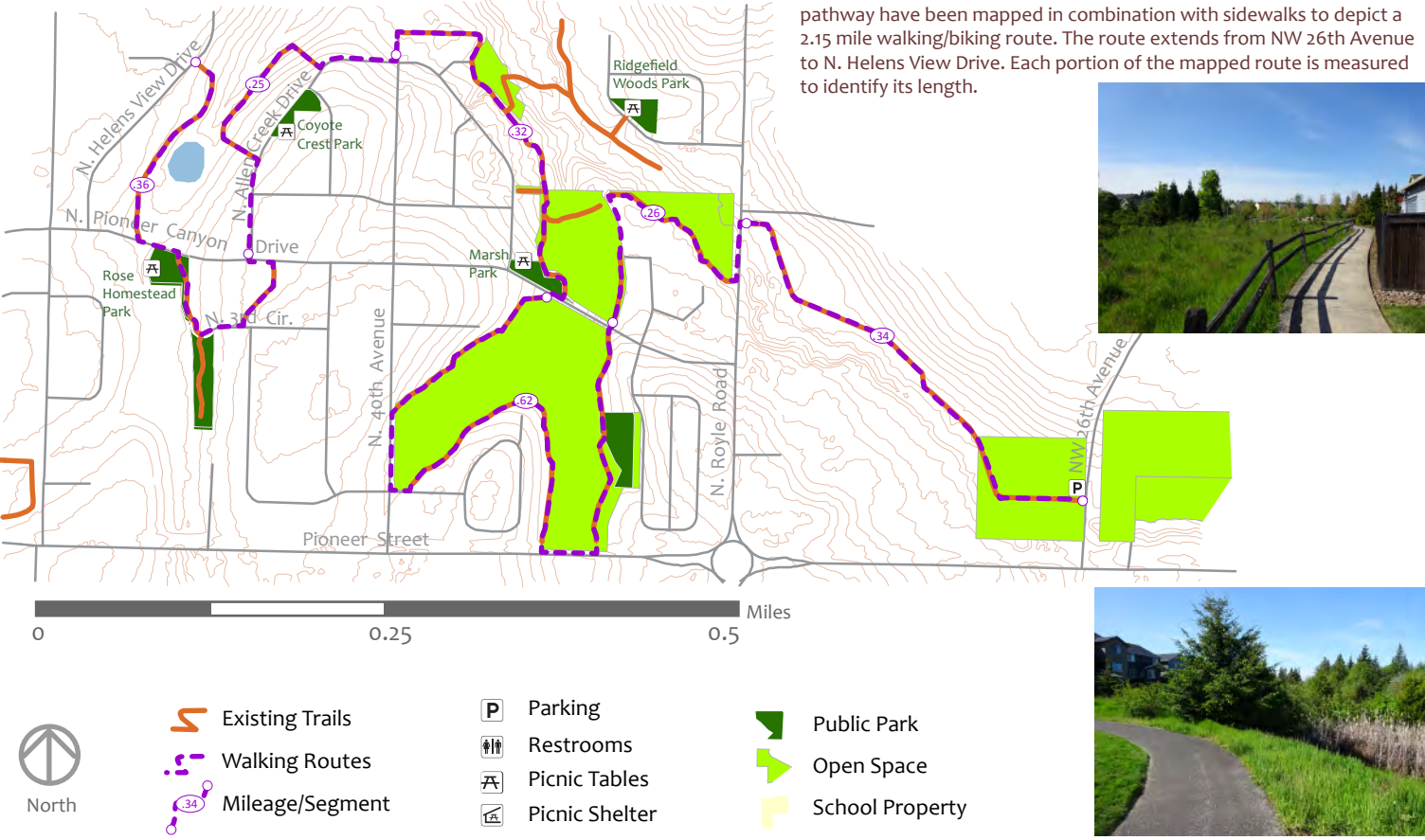

GEE CREEK TRAIL

The Gee Creek Trail follows the Creek from N. Heron Drive through Abrams Park and crosses Pioneer Street for approximately ¾ of a mile. An additional mile of the Gee Creek Trail continues upstream (south) through the Gee Creek Loop neighborhood, behind the Hillhurst neighborhood to the Osprey Point Open Space where access is available at the end of S. 13th Circle. Trail surfaces and conditions vary along the existing 1.73 mile length of the Gee Creek Trail.

RIDGEFIELD NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE (RNWR) TRAILS

The RNWR Kiwa Trail is open seasonally and offers a loop trail approximately 1.45 miles in length, accessed from the River “S” unit driving loop.

The Carty Lake Trail connects from the waterfront trail on Port property to the Cathlapotle Plankhouse measuring approximately 1.13 miles. From the Plankhouse to the southeast edge of the Refuge at Main Street, the pathway covers 0.43 miles. From the end of this RNWR pathway following the new pedestrian sidewalk along Main Street, the walk to Division Street would cover 0.71 miles.



TRAIL MAP



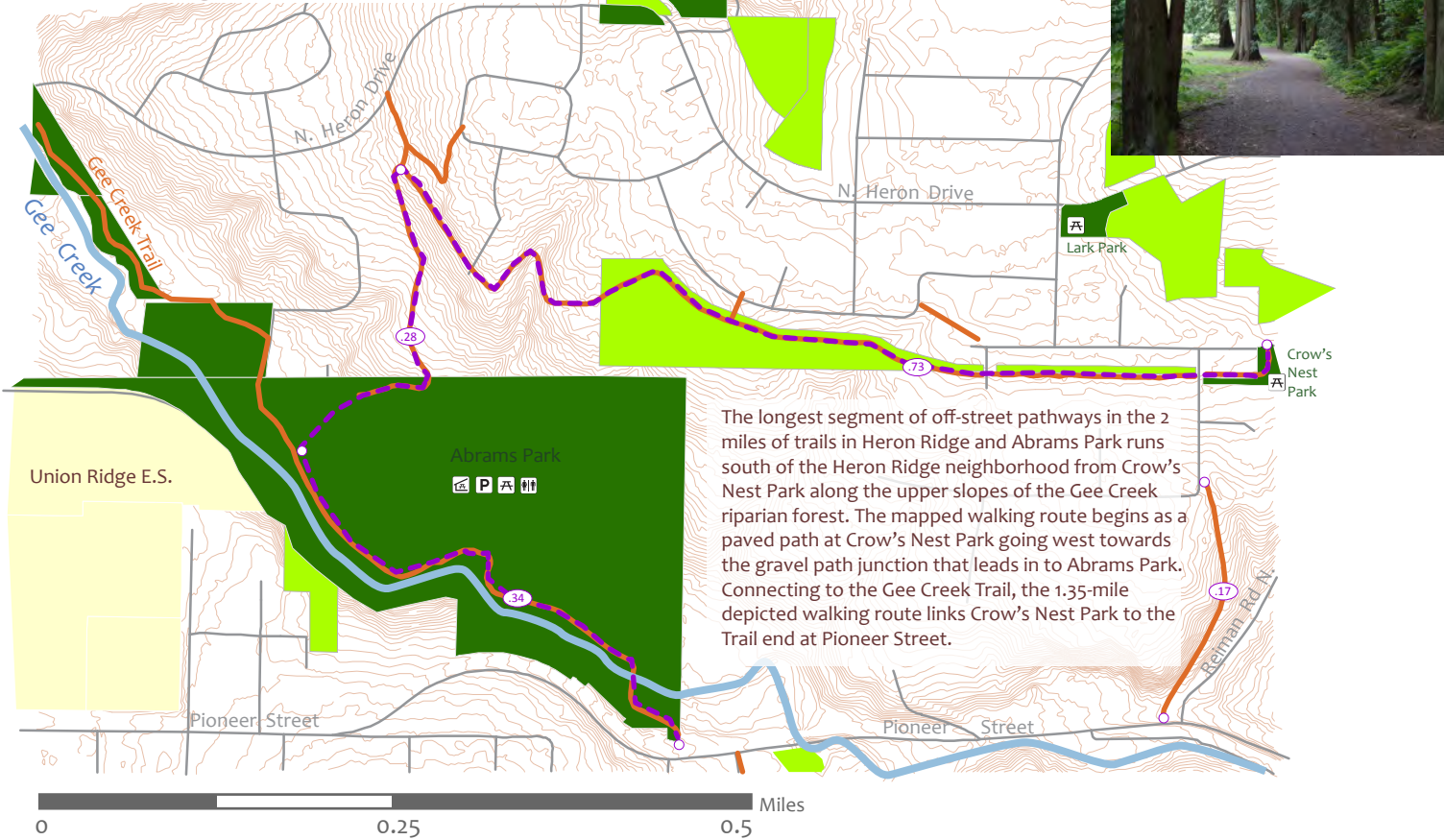
While the Ridgefield trail system is still growing in conjunction with new residential development, this trail map can help orient walkers, runners and bikers to the many options for exploring the existing paved and unpaved pathways throughout the City's neighborhoods.

Only a few trail locations have off-street parking. Most trails are part of neighborhoods where some on-street parking is allowed.

Restroom facilities are limited to specific sites including Abrams Park, Overlook Park, Ridgefield Sports Complex, the Port of Ridgefield Marina, and the Ridgefield National Wildlife Refuge.

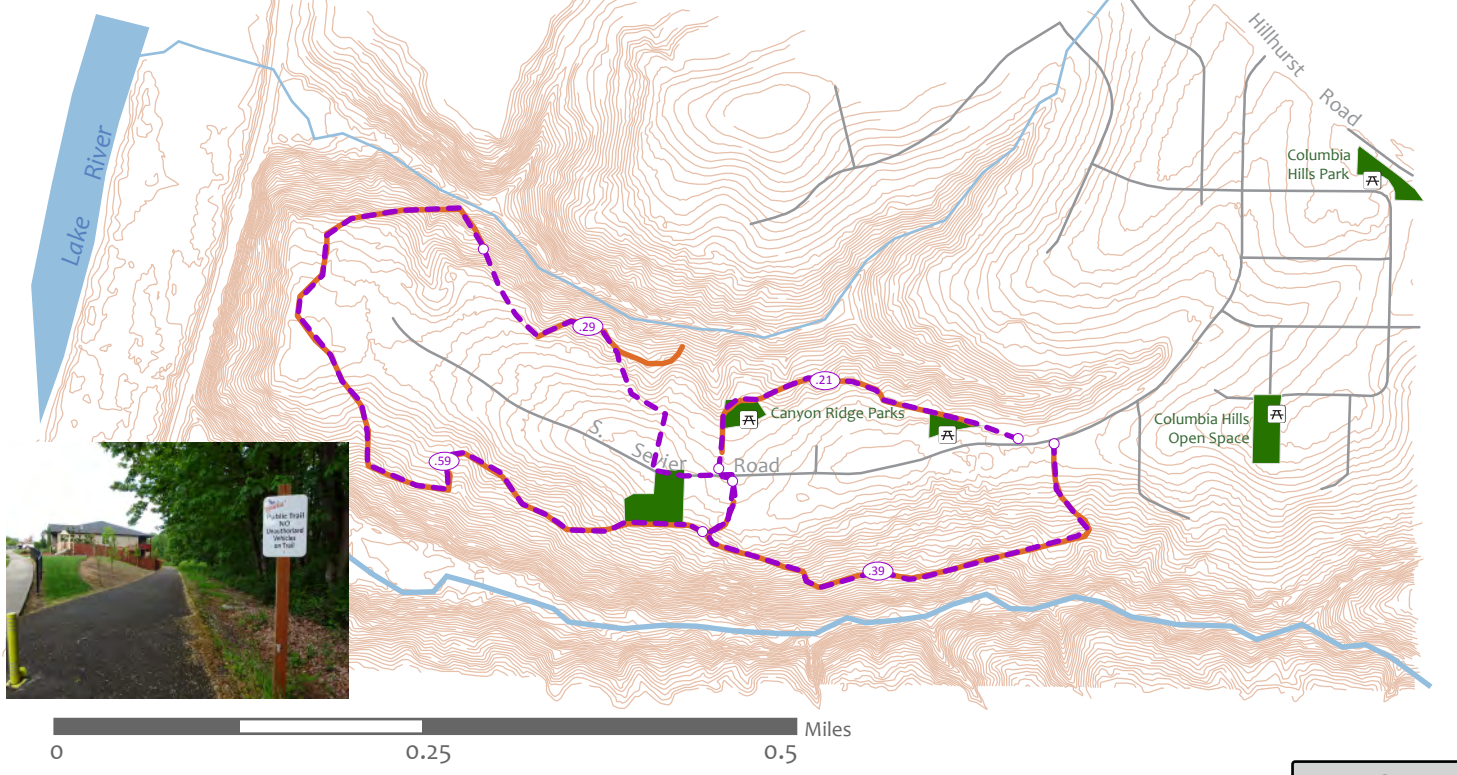


Heron Ridge & Abrams Park



Canyon Ridge

Canyon Ridge trails are primarily in the woods and traverse the steeper slopes of the woodland natural areas surrounding the homes along S. Sevier Road. All trail segments together cover approximately 1 ¼ miles but combined with sidewalk connections and street crossings, a figure-eight loop route can compile almost 1.5 miles. The trails have a variety of surfacing from asphalt and crushed rock to native soils with some very steep portions, and varied trail widths.



Sharing the trail with others, whether walking, running or biking, is the code of conduct. Please be courteous.
